Mistaken Goals of Behaviour

As educators and parents we often ask why children engage in challenging behaviours. Austrian Psychologist and educator Rudolph Dreikurs described four goals of behaviour and proposed that children "misbehave" out of a mistaken assumption that they can gain social status through challenging behaviour.

Objectives:

- Identify Dreikur's 4 Mistaken Goals of Behaviour.
- Understand these goals and learn how to apply techniques to guide the children in our care.
- Explore helpful ways to respond to challenging behaviour.

Rethinking Weapon Play: An Example of Reflective Practice

This workshop presents a first-hand account from a 3-5 program that struggled with how to handle weapon play, and the resultant evolution of their policies and principles. It details the process taken, and the use of reflective practice in approaching this complex issue. Pedagogical documentation on the use of weapon-play in programs and educator reflections will be included in the presentation.

Objectives:

- Appreciate what reflective practice looks like, and how it can benefit your program.
- Explore how and why this program went from a zero-tolerance approach to a more open approach to weapon play and what that evolution looked like.
- Engage in reflection and discussion on the motivations, benefits and concerns around weapon play and how the program is currently engaging with weapon play.

Children Have Stress Too

Learning to handle stress is an important life skill for everyone. Developed by the Psychology Foundation of Canada, this training teaches educators to help children enhance their physical, mental, emotional and behavioural coping skills, thinking styles and key abilities during the important window of opportunity of the early years. By providing participants with more information, tools and strategies, this training will help them learn effective ways to promote positive emotional development and self-regulation in young children, and create a learning environment that reduces stress and supports children by helping them to begin to effectively cope with stress.

Objectives:

- Understand the impact of stress on young children.
- Learn to recognize and respond to stress in children.
- Identify the key relationships which parents and caregivers play in helping children learn to manage stress.
- Practice age-appropriate stress management techniques that help teach children to relax and become more resilient.
- Explore effective ways to promote positive emotional development and self-regulation in young children.

Objectives:


- Discuss the importance of risk taking for healthy child development.
